FROM MY HEART TO YOURS

Dear Friends,

Alban Institute's Summer issue of "Congregations" has an article by Jill Hudson that is worth your Church's time as you come to the end of 2010 and begin planning for 2011. It would be very valuable reading for a variety of church leadership people.

Her research, observations, and interviews suggest that there are "Twelve Characteristics For Effective 21st Century Ministry." They are the ability to: maintain personal and professional balance; guide transformational faith; motivate a church to be a mission outpost; communicate a vision, promote spiritual formation; provide leadership for high-quality worship experiences; identify, develop, and support lay leaders; build and inspire a team; navigate technology; manage conflict; and be a lifelong learner.

She writes, "To be effective in ministry...requires that both pastor and congregation truly struggle to discern what's working and what's not, what needs to be added, and what has to be retired to make room for God's new vision for ministry."

Contrary to what many of my colleagues maintain, it has little to do with whether or not to wear clerical garb on Sundays, whether to change the by-laws, whether to go to another denomination (or go it alone). It has everything to do with falling in love with your congregation and your call, and respecting the tradition into which you have been called. That means practicing Christianity in a Congregational environment, which has never been more important, exciting, and more needed in religious milieu in which too many churches have become stalemated environments of contention and lite-theology.

May 2011 be a year in which your church shares a more effective witness to the life, ministry, and work of Jesus Christ.

CAMPAIGN CORNER *Branching Out Activities**BRANCHING OUT*

A year ago the Church of Christ in Winsted, Connecticut began a journey of transformation by covenanting with the NACCC to use RSI's capital stewardship services to conduct their own capital campaign. We are happy to report that they recently concluded their campaign with more than \$254,000 in pledges. This

church, originally gathered in 1854 and currently led by Rev. Douglas Aldrich, will use the funds to make some much needed renovation and repairs.

In late September, members of the Congregational Foundation Board of Governors, the Executive Committee, and the NACCC staff met at the Center for Congregational Leadership in Olivet, Michigan for an intensive, two-day training and planning session to prepare for the *Branching Out* campaign's conclusion. Between now and June 2011, they will be seeking new donors and asking previous donors to renew or extend their pledges, in the hope of achieving full funding for the campaign's two initiatives.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETING HIGHLIGHTS

The National Association's Executive Committee met in Oak Creek November 4-6. The minutes will be posted on the Association's website. Here are a few highlights from that meeting.

- ◆ Sale of office property — no official bids yet but two very interested parties.
- ◆ Approval of Commission on Youth Ministries scholarship plan, which would make it possible for more young people to attend our National Conferences.
- ◆ Creation of a team to work on future national web site development.
- ◆ Finance Committee and P & A working on ways to deal with significant rate hike in medical insurance.
- ◆ Postponement of the request to hire a full-time development director.
- ◆ Report on recent successful education events and programs at our Center for Congregational Leadership.
- ◆ Accepted three churches into provisional membership (pending vote and installation in Scottsdale) in North Carolina, Kansas, and Michigan.
- ◆ Creation of new publication which will be used when leaders are visiting member churches.
- ◆ Adopted a records management policy for regular and archival records.
- ◆ Reaffirmed policy regarding honorariums to speakers/presenters at our Annual Meeting & Conference.
- ◆ Requested of the World Christian Relations commission to focus on providing our churches with resources for World Communion Sunday, World Day of Prayer, and best practices in ecumenical and interfaith relations.
- ◆ Encouraged further development of the Strategic Plan.

A MOMENT IN HISTORY

Beginnings: A Bible for the People

When the Pilgrims and Puritans who settled New England opened their Bibles, to whom were they dedicated? If you answer “King James,” you are mistaken. As a matter of fact, the King James Bible was produced in large part to counter the influence of the Bible these English Reformers had published! In 1560, fifty-one years prior to the King James, and after hundreds of years of Bibles in Latin only (therefore inaccessible to all but clergy & other scholars), and reading an English-language Bible having been declared a capital crime, they had produced the first complete & scholarly English-language Bible, the Geneva Bible, dedicated to Elizabeth I. It, not the King James, was the Bible of Pilgrims & Puritans, of Milton, of Shakespeare, of Oliver Cromwell, of Presbyterians & Baptists as well as Congregationalists for many years after the KJV was granted a monopoly for printing in England.

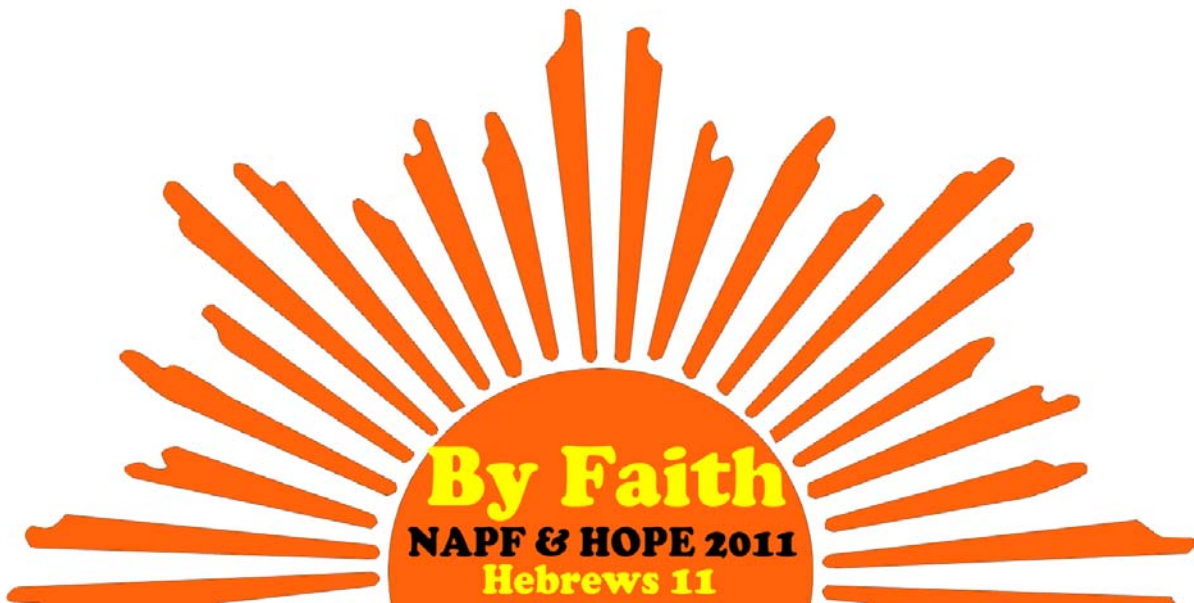
Why Geneva? After all, that was Switzerland, not England! But this was John Calvin's Geneva. The Puritans were Calvinists and fled to him in 1557 after Mary Queen of Scots came to the throne determined to stamp out Protestantism. Their work was built on the English New Testament of William Tyndale (1494-1536), who had been martyred for his troubles, and led by Calvin's English brother-in-law, William Whittingham. The eight-hundred-some Geneva-trained Puritans, including John Knox, the founder of Presbyterianism, still hoped that under the next monarch England might undergo a more thorough reform on Calvin's model. In that they were to be disappointed, in part because Knox published an unfortunate pamphlet declaring that Elizabeth, being a woman, was not fit to govern.

Their Geneva Bible however, was hugely successful, with 140+ editions eventually published. Its importance was that ordinary church-goers now had access to the Bible! This made a believer's church grounded in the written Word of God possible for the first time. The Geneva Bible truly was foundational for Congregationalism and all churches of the English Reformation. This implication was not lost on the state church or the monarch. Elizabeth's successor, James, and the church hierarchy quickly began work on something closer in tone to the old Latin Bible and which, moreover, did not have the extensive and markedly Protestant annotations that accompanied the Geneva, which it then became illegal to publish.

Largely lost to modern consciousness for many years, the Geneva Bible is now available in both facsimile and modern spelling and typesetting versions. For an exhaustive but eye-opening history of the English Bible, see David Daniel, *The Bible in English*, Yale, 2003.

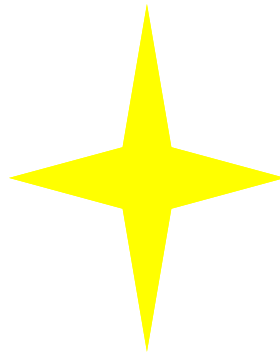
