FROM MY HEART TO YOURS

Dear Friends,

Another annual gathering is past, and we are administratively “unpacking” the experience. The comments we heard and still hear are that, despite the reduction in the number of people attending, the positive feeling of forward movement was unmistakable.

The town hall gathering, as former Executive Chairperson, Dr. Neil Hunt called it, was an open forum evening devoted to questions and concerns attendees had about decisions the Executive Committee had made on their behalf during the last year. Two items were of particular interest - the sale of the Oak Creek property and the Strategic Plan.

Joelle Sommers, a member of the Oak Creek Property Team, had already submitted a written report and was present to answer questions. Jim Hopkins outlined the strategic plan and answered questions. The property sale was on the business agenda for vote, but the hope of the strategic planning team was to get an affirmation from the group to continue unfolding this plan for the next year. The vote to sell the property was overwhelmingly in favor. The affirmation to continue the work of the strategic plan was positive as well.

Next steps? The Executive Committee under its new chairperson, Lowell Linden, has appointed two separate teams to move the property issue forward – a Property Sale Team, and a Post-Sale Team. One will deal with the negotiations of the sale, the other finding a new home for our office.

The Strategic Planning Team has been re-constituted, with some new members and reps from each of the divisions of the Association, to tackle how best to proceed with implementing the plan.

You will hear more about these important measures as they unfold, along with others that we are still “unpacking.”

A synopsis of the Annual Meeting and Conference is being emailed to all churches who are on-line, and is uploaded on our web site www.naccc.org. For churches not on-line a copy will be sent in a bulk mailing later this summer.

Anchorage was a truly inspirational and important gathering where we enjoyed the setting, the warm hospitality, and handled some important issues facing our Association. And First Congregational Church, Anchorage is an amazing group of people!

2010 ANNUAL MEETING & CONFERENCE HIGHLIGHTS



New Member Churches. We welcomed five new churches into the NACCC. They are: Church in the Cove, Beverly, MA; Cambria Congregational, Lockport, NY; First Congregational, Rio Vista, CA; Peacham Congregational, VT; Trinity Congregational, Grand Rapids, MI.

218 Attendees representing 26 states. CA and MI had the highest representation and 4 missionaries were in attendance. Delegates approved an increase in Fair Share and Fair Share Plus levels, voted in favor of moving forward with the sale of the Oak Creek Property, and passed by-law changes to better define active and inactive member churches.

Churches Receive Grants. Two churches were the recipients of grants from the John Richard Fund—FCC, Albany, NY; and FCC, Saugatuck, MI. Both were for musical arts programs.

A Green Team was established to explore the creative things our churches are doing in the stewardship of creation. Members of the team are listed on our web site www.naccc.org. If you are interested in working on this project please contact lmiller@naccc.org for details.

Youth (NAPF) and Young adults (HOPE). There were 154 attendees, 43 HOPE and 87 NAPF plus counselors and directors. Their activities included working in soup kitchens, food banks, homeless shelters, low income homes. It was an amazing spiritual experience for young people from 21 NACCC churches!

Strategic Plan. The Strategic Planning Team shared their plan for a renewed NACCC and were affirmed by the delegates and given encouragement to continue to unfold the plan in this next year.

Individuals Honored. Jim Hopkins was given this year's Executive Committee citation for his years of service to the Association; Claudia Kniefel received the Jeannette Butman Award in appreciation for her service to the NACCC, including hosting this year's Meeting and Conference; Lowell Linden received the Harry Butman award for excellence in ministry; Rob Joy received the J.J. Russell Sermon Award; and Joelle Sommers received the Donna Alexander Award.

Congratulations and Thank You to First Congregational Church of Anchorage, AK for a marvelous job hosting our 2010 Annual Meeting and Conference! Over 60 volunteers from the church helped make this conference a success!

Congregational Lecturer. Wayne Riggs, Senior Minister of Plymouth Congregational Church in San Diego, urged us to pay closer attention to our covenantal relationship to each other and to our Association.

Bible Lecturer. Rev. Dr. Jeffrey Kuan, Associate Professor in New Testament Studies at Pacific School of Religion, spoke on the theme from Isaiah, and the nature of prophecy.

Keynote Speaker. Rev. Dr. Beth Bingham of Pilgrim Congregational Church in Pomona, took us on a poetic and spiritual journey through Alaska, based on her years as a minister at our host church years ago.

ICF Co-Moderator Val Price, brought us greetings from the International Congregational Fellowship as well as a DVD of greetings from many of our sister associations around the world.

Three Seminary Graduates, from the Congregational Foundation for Theological Studies (CFTS) were recognized. *James Bonnema* graduated from St. Paul School of Theology with an M.Div. and *Matthew Oladele* graduated from Eden Theological Seminary with an M.Div.

Terry Bobzien has completed the CFTS requirements and graduated from Ecumenical Theological Seminar with an M.Div. Terry is Senior Minister at First Congregational Church of Pittsford, Michigan.

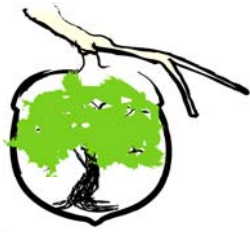
A Delegate's Experience in Anchorage

I write to assure you that One Great Hour of Sharing funds sent through the Missionary Society for Haiti Earthquake Relief are meeting the needs of those who have been displaced – the hungry and homeless, widows, widowers and orphans, along with those in need of medical and spiritual care.

I have the utmost confidence, and highest regard, for our relief partners in Haiti – GAP/Canaan Ministries, Project Help Haiti, A Voice in the Wilderness, and those who are linked to Church World Service. We receive regular and frequent reports of services rendered, along with receipts, acknowledgements and thanks for funds sent and received. Information is also available on their websites and blogs.

As of this writing, we have disbursed:

- \$36,500 to GAP/Canaan Ministries (www.gap-haiti.com)
- \$10,000 to Project Help Haiti (<http://project-help-haiti.blogspot.com>)
- \$15,000 to “A Voice in the Wilderness” ministries (www.sharingjesus.org)
- \$25,000 to Church World Service (www.churchworldservice.org)

We are blessed to know our Haitian partners personally (and we trust the work and partners of Church World Service). They tell us the emergency has passed, but the long, hard work of recovery is just beginning. They also tell us they need (y)our continued support.

The recovery of Haiti will be years in the making. We know our Haitian partners to be people of integrity, committed to those they serve, for as long as it takes to help them. Please pray and consider continuing your support for the good work being done.

Greetings from Muskegon, Michigan,

McGrift Memorial Congregational Church -along with 3 other Congregational Churches- sponsor 13 low caste village pastors in India. One Sunday, while talking to the early elementary children about missions, I mentioned that 7 of our pastors had to walk everywhere they went. They didn't even have a bicycle. (And, sometimes they walked for several days.)

Owen and Ava, 2nd grade and Kindergarten, said that they were glad their pastor, Dr. Wahr, didn't have to walk all the way to Grand Rapids (an hour drive away) when he visited their daddy in the hospital. Olivia, also in Kindergarten, could not believe that these men made it all the way to being grown up without anybody buying them a bike. She got one for her 5 year old birthday. The children all joined in, telling how old they were when they received their two-wheelers. Their little hearts were breaking on behalf of the pastors in India. The question came at last: "Can't we buy bikes?"

Then an idea emerged: "Let's have a Bikeathon!" They would get sponsors like their parents do for the Crop Walk and they would ride on the bike trail not far from the church.

Fourteen children, mostly 4-7 year olds, participated in the bikeathon on June 5th. They realized that bicycles would cost \$95 dollars each. Most of the adults, watching the parade of bikes leaving the church parking lot, doubted that the little ones would really earn that much money or that they could all make the 1 hour ride without turning back.

But, they did it! 100% of the children made the ride (and had enough energy for a celebration picnic on the church lawn afterwards) and already Sunday they had collected \$700, which was sent Monday morning to India, presenting those seven pastors with brand new bikes. What a thrill! What an accomplishment. But, that's not the end of the story.

The children have been bringing offerings, collecting quarter cards, bringing in cans & bottles, and gathering used computer cartridges for the last two years, raising money for Bibles for India. Their secondary goal for the bikeathon, should they earn more than needed for 7 bikes, was 13 Bibles for pastors' wives and 36 study Bibles for the volunteer cell leaders in the villages. As more and more people hear about the efforts of the McGrift kids, more money keeps coming in. It looks like we'll need another celebration picnic very soon!

We are so proud of our mission minded young children and the families (and church) who support their efforts. This happened on Pentecost Sunday. They had the Bible lesson of Pentecost in Sunday School. Then, following Sunday School, they went out in the power of the Holy Spirit to make a difference in the world.
